# Mental Health Levy on Nov. 6 Ballot in Clark County

Tuesday, November 6, Clark County residents will have the opportunity to voice their support for the Mental Health renewal levy. Voting for it supports 25% of all mental health and addiction services in Clark County. And the cost of these services is minimal: the owner of a \$100,000 home would pay less than \$3 per month. While cost is low, impact is high. Each year, Mental Health and Recovery Board (MHRB) funds help 10,000 Clark County residents access programs, services, and resources at 11 local partner agencies.

Voting for the levy means voting for help, healing, and hope. It means building supportive communities, strong families, and safe schools. But don't take our word for it. Below, Kenwood Elementary School Counselor Emily Zimmerman shares how MHRB funds impact Clark County youth and families:

"Like many other educators, I hope to see my students go on to reach their maximum potential for personal, social, academic, and career success. The Mental Health and Recovery Board (MHRB) of Clark, Greene & Madison Counties helps me do just that.

This school year, my school is implementing the PAX Good Behavior Game (GBG). MHRB is the primary funder for PAX GBG in Clark County. Lifetime outcomes for students exposed to even just one year of PAX GBG are significant. They exhibit:

- ■less use of nicotine;
- less abuse of alcohol and other drugs;
- greater persistence toward high school graduation;
- greater matriculation rates into college and other post-secondary training programs;
- less need for individualized education programs;
- less need for mental health services; and
- fewer suicide ideation/attempts.

I want to take a minute and briefly discuss suicide ideation and attempts, because it really hits home for me. Because I work in an elementary school, you may not think I deal with many concerns of suicide ideation and self-harm, but I do...quite frequently. My students are in kindergarten through sixth grade. The conversations we have vary from comments of self-harm to students who say they want to commit suicide and do have the means and access to execute their plan. It's very concerning. Just last spring, I talked about suicide with five students in a period of three consecutive school days. I take them all very seriously. Since many of these students were in the fifth grade last year, I'm thankful for MHRB funding that allowed me

## Frequently Asked Questions about the Clark County Levy

## Q. What is the levy?

**A.** The proposed levy, which will appear on the Clark County ballot this November,

is a **renewal levy** that affects property owners in Clark County. Its funds support mental health, alcohol and other drug addiction, treatment, prevention, and recovery support services in Clark County. These services provide help, healing, and hope to the community.

## Q. How much will it cost?

**A.** The levy affects Clark County property owners. The owner of a \$100,000 home would pay less than \$3 per month, or \$35 annually to support these services.

# Q. Are these funds used in Clark, Greene & Madison Counties?

**A.** No. Levy funds are only able to be used in the county from which they are collected. In this case, the levy funds will support services for residents of Clark County only, although levy funds follow the resident because they may access care outside of Clark County.

# Q. What do you do? Who will benefit from the levy funds?

**A.** We oversee the administration of funds for mental health, alcohol and other drug addiction, treatment, prevention, and recovery support services. Nearly 10,000

Clark County residents receive these services each year. Not only do they receive a direct benefit, but their families and the community at-large benefit when we help those with mental health afflictions to maintain a healthy lifestyle.
